## **CONCURRENT DEGREES, CERTIFICATE, AND NEW DEGREE PROGRAMS**

## Comparison of Graduate Program Options

The development of graduate program options, certificates, concurrent degrees and new degree programs all require the approval of the Graduate School. This guide is intended to help you distinguish between the options and determine the process and requirements for approval.

Enrollment Eligibility	Students are admitted and enrolled per program guidelines.	Students enroll as part of their graduate degree program.	<ul> <li>Graduate, professional, or graduate non-matriculated student status is required for admission to graduate certificate programs.</li> <li>Certificate programs are usually open to students from varying departments, programs, or interest areas.</li> </ul>	Students are admitted and enrolled in two graduate degree programs.
How Recognition is Given	<ul> <li>Degree is noted on the official transcript and diploma.</li> </ul>	Degree option is noted on the official transcript but not on the diploma.
